Fourth Grade Summer Reading Assignments!

1. Read *The Lemonade War* by Jacqueline Davies. This will be your literature circle (a.k.a. “book club”) book. As you read the book I’d like you to keep a journal.

Here is what I would like to see in your journal:

1. Before you read the book, look at the picture on the cover. Predict what you think the book will be about based on the cover illustration.

2. Begin to read and keep some notes. Here are some ideas to think about:

Character(s): Who are the main characters?

Setting: Where does the story take place?

When does the story take place? (Past? Present? Future?)

3. Could the events in this story actually happen or is the story a fantasy?

4. Is the main character someone you would enjoy being friends with?
Why or why not?

5. Did you like the book and would you recommend it to your friends?
Why or why not?

6. Please feel free to write down any other observations that seem important to you.

2. Read *From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler* by E.L. Konigsburg. Enjoy reading it!

3. Choose a biography or play to read. Your local library will have a reading list that you can look at for ideas. Enjoy reading it!

Please choose **at least** 3 of the following activities to complete this summer. However, I encourage you to do more. Don't forget to bring them in on the first day of school!

1. Spin a globe or page through an atlas and pick an unfamiliar place to research. Find out 10 interesting things about it.
2. Design a poster encouraging people to visit Rhode Island.
3. Go for a walk in the woods. Make a list of all the animals you see. You can get a field guide at the library that will help you identify animals you are not familiar with.
4. Plant a seed. Keep a plant journal and record the growth of your plant and any observations you make.
5. Write your own book and illustrate it.
6. Volunteer your time. Look into visiting a nursing home, walking a dog at a shelter, reading to younger children, or ask your parents for other ideas.
7. Write and send a letter to your favorite author.
8. Illustrate your favorite song or poem.
